At Parliament Hill the First Nations members plan on setting up a tepee, giving a few speeches, followed by a press conference. On 08 Apr 10, an RCMP Aboriginal and Ethics Liaison Officer is to meet with the Tribal Council to determine the issues being presented at Parliament Hill.

Minor traffic disruptions / delays may be encountered and should be anticipated along the planed route of the march.

6. **(C) Synopsis:** Cold Lake First Nations (CLFN) have erected a blockade across the access road to the English Bay Provincial Recreation Area. This blockade is approximately 1 km from Hwy 897, the only access road to the Cold Lake Air Weapons Range.

7. **(C) Details:** Source related that the CLFN is blocking the access road to the English Bay Provincial Recreation Area. There is an ongoing dispute between the Provincial Government and the CLFN over future development of the recreation area. Source further stated the situation is peaceful at the blockade site and Source does not foresee any areas of concern for the Canadian Forces or 4 Wing Cold Lake (NFI).

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8. (C) Source related that the blockade is located approximate 1 km East of Highway 897 and at this time the situation is peaceful. Source does not believe the blockade would move from its current position and the blockade should not affect 4 Wing's operations.

9. (C) At this time, there do not appear to be any security issues resulting from the blockade and the ongoing dispute is between the Provincial Government and the CLFN. 4 Wg MP Det has been informed of the situation. shall continue and all new information indicating an impact on the day-to-day operations of 4 Wing by this dispute shall be reported accordingly.

6. **(C) Synopsis:** OSINT reporting indicated that First Nations (FN) leaders in Northern Ontario were upset with current Ontario Northern development Legislature set to pass which would limit their control over the land claims. The following information was learned

a. in an article contained in the Ottawa Citizen, dated 16 Sep 10, it is mentioned that Ontario is heading towards a conflict with FN after the province moved ahead with contentious legislature governing northern development.

b. This will include half of the “northern boreal region”, which is about 42 % of the province and is believed to hold rich ore deposits.

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- c. Two individual leaders held concerns with the new legislation. They are Citizen 1 who stated that if legislation passed, he would oppose it "by any means necessary" and Citizen 2, executive director of a FN Counsel who stated "if it passes as is, there is going to be conflict on the land". Citizen 2 further stated, "we cannot simply just hand over jurisdiction to the government of Ontario, because the jurisdiction was given to us by the creator and we will uphold that. That is our sacred responsibility".
- d. The article further reported that the threat opens the specter of disruptive occupations similar to the Caledonia occupation in southwestern Ontario community since 2006. The Ontario government is attempting to cool the situation; however FN members are upset that their voices were not heard.
- e. Source A and Source B indicated that they have no specific concerns at this time;
Both Source A & B will contact this office should any new information be learned.

7. **(C)** Currently, there is no DND/CF and/or involved in the lands disputes themselves; however any could be negatively impacted. This Detachment will continue to monitor the situation for potential and/or additional threats towards DND/CF personnel, establishments and/or assets in the area. Should any new information come to light, a further INTREP will be submitted.

8. **(C)** In the Caledonia, Tyendinaga and Sharbot Lake FN protests, typical tactics used included blocking main roads and railway lines along with occupying affected land in order to prevent continued development. Other FN bands, often outside the affected area, will conduct smaller local activities in support of the larger protests. These tactics may include the establishment of information points on local highways or protests at Government buildings. The majority of FN protests remain disruptive but non-violent.

1. (C) **HST PROTESTS AND HIGHWAY SHUTDOWNS:** Open and closed source information has revealed that Batchewana First Nation is planning to commence a peaceful blockade of the Huron Central rail line at 0800 hrs June 21, 2010 in recognition of the National Aboriginal Day. Open source news indicates that the blockades are aimed at preventing shipments from leaving the area. While a blockade of the Huron Central rail line by Batchewana First Nation is expected to occur within the jurisdiction of the Sault Ste Marie Police Service, a possibility exists that other First Nations communities along Highway 17 corridor will engage in supporting protests in areas which fall under the jurisdiction of the OPP. The Garden River First Nations may also join with protests by setting up toll booths and stalling summer traffic on the Trans-Canada Highway if the HST exemption is not restored. On 17 Jun 10, First Nations communities were asked to host public awareness slowdowns at key access points across Ontario and a blockade of the 401 and major railways lines is anticipated (NFI on exact location). If the government adopts the declaration it will be a celebration, if not, the AFN Chiefs expect negative fallout from this decision. 11 Jun 10, is the Anniversary of the Federal Government's apology to the "Residential School Survivors". This apology will be seen as hollow if the government does not adopt the UN declaration. AFN Chiefs did not indicate what type of negative fallout could be expected.

8. **(C)** : Historically, protests conducted by the First Nation Tribes have been peaceful however, with the large number of non Aboriginal supporters in attendance disturbances cannot be ruled out. With this being declared the "National Year of Action", a larger than usual number of rallies and demonstrations are expected this summer. Should any

adverse threat information come to light, it will be reported accordingly. **END**

(C) As part of the ongoing First Nation land dispute near Deseronto, ON, protestors from the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory blocked Hwy 401 for several hours during the Canada Day weekend of 2007. The portion of Highway between Napanee and Belleville should be considered a primary area for this group. OSINT indicates that 22 May is "Mohawk Landing", a significant day for Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte area.

6. **(C) Synopsis:** CFNCIU Cen Det was contacted by Source A and the following information was learned:
 - a. open source has indicated a local CTV news outlet in Northern Ontario has reported the Garden River First Nations have installed signage to identify locations of the new reserve community tolls along Highway 17 that will be installed and manned during the coming weeks. This is an extension from the Harmonized Sales Tax (HST) Railroad/Highway demonstrations held in April 2010 (NFI);
 - b. recently in Thunder Bay, Ontario, a native protest against the HST took place. This was a scheduled event and local law enforcement observed the protest. There were no incidents as a result of this protest; and
 - c. in relation to the Native Protests, the Valee Inco Mine of Sudbury is currently having contract renewal issues with its union. Essentially this mine is the major employer within the Sudbury region. This mine employs approximately 90,000 people throughout the area.

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This

alleged threat will also involve the local area Natives and they may use this opportunity as a platform to further expand their protest against the HST. The protest may include road and railway blockades in and around the Sudbury region (NFI).

7. **(C)** In light of numerous reports of upcoming HST Protests within the Northern Ontario Region,

6. **(C) Synopsis:** First Nations are planning protests over the new Ontario Harmonized Sales Tax (HST) set to take effect on 1 July 2010.

7. **(C) Details:** CFNCIU Central Det attended a meeting where the following information concerning HST and native protests was learned:

- a. with the upcoming implementation of the HST, this tax change is being strongly opposed by Ontario's First Nations communities due to Ontario's alleged failure to consult with First Nations prior to the legislative approval and the potential impacts of increased taxation on First Nations Sovereignty;
- b. First Nations opposition to the HST has to date manifested in peaceful public demonstrations coordinated by the Chiefs of Ontario. However, information indicates that extremists within some First Nations communities have discussed the possible employment of "Direct Action" tactics. While the capability of these individuals to carry out such acts is unknown, a possibility exists that First Nations extremists opposed to the

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HST may engage in activities with the potential to impact public safety in Ontario. Further, left-wing extremists involved in Native solidarity and anti-poverty movements in Ontario may also engage in Anti-HST demonstrations;

- c. following the implementation of the HST, Aboriginals residing in Ontario will be subjected to a 13% tax at off reserve points of sale and will have to apply to Canada Revenue Agency for an 8% reimbursement. Due to the extreme poverty of many First Nations communities in Ontario, the implementation of the HST is being viewed as especially harsh treatment;
- d. historically, First Nations sovereignty protests have included the targeting of infrastructure along with road and rail blockades because of the effectiveness of such tactics to cause disruption and draw public and media attention.
- e. correspondence from the Chiefs of Ontario to First Nations communities across the Province has endorsed education and information campaigns to promote awareness amongst the general public and "Direct Action" tactics including road and railway blockades;
- f. while opposition to the HST has been peaceful thus far, it is important to consider that extremists within Ontario's First Nations communities may employ violence during HST protests. Previously, Native extremists in Caledonia have targeted hydro substations and dismantled towers for use in blockades of area roadways to oppose issues affecting First Nations. Native extremists at Tyendinaga have engaged in road blockades of CN Rail Lines and Highway 401 and a possibility exists that similar incidents may occur in anti-HST protests;
